Letter to Your Principal: School Uniforms

The Unstylish Cost of Uniforms



Claim and Focus

The essay states a clear claim in the introduction ("uniforms should not be required... [they] are way too expensive, they stop students from expressing themselves ...and wearing them will not prevent bullying") and maintains adequate focus on developing the claim throughout the essay.



Support and Evidence

Relevant evidence is cited ("School uniforms 'cost too much for families...") and reasoning is provided to support some of the points of the claim. However, the "bullying" point is developed unevenly, providing only generalizations, rather than cited evidence and detailed explanations.



Organization

Purposeful organization is employed, as paragraphs are structured for the introduction, the points of the claim, and a conclusion. Varied transitions, although basic, show the relationships between ideas ("According to," "Another good point is," "These pieces of evidence prove").



Language and Style

A consistent voice and formal style are maintained throughout the essay. An awareness of the reader's interests is demonstrated with precise and interesting word choices ("mandatory," "empowered," "monetary") and adequately varied sentence structure.



Using Exemplars in Your Lessons

Exemplar essays are tools to take abstract descriptions and make them more concrete for students. One way to use them is to print the clean copies of the essays and allow students to use the rubric to make notes or even find examples of important elements of an essay - thesis statements, introductions, evidence, conclusions, transitions, etc. Teachers can also use exemplars to illustrate what each score point within a trait 'looks like' in an authentic student essay. The Unstylish Cost of Uniforms

Another good point is when Marian Wilde says that uniforms "Are an unfair additional expense for parents who pay taxes for a free public education" (Source 1). She is saying that they already pay taxes to the school, so they shouldn't have to pay for a special clothes. These pieces of evidence prove that school uniforms are too expensive, and people do not deserve to be charged for them.

When it comes to style, school uniforms aren't the best. With no patterns, single colors, and the fact of wearing the same type of shirt and pants every day, people will get bored and unenthusiastic about getting ready for school. They would make excitement and school spirit a lot less. Having school uniforms tends to make kids bored and unhappy, while having freedom in choosing their

outfit has proven to make them enthusiastic and joyful. In Source 1, Marian Wilde explains how school uniforms "Violate a student's right to freedom of expression"(Source 1). When a child is picking their outfit, they feel trusted to express their creativity, attitude, and personality. Students are proud of their rights to pick their own outfits. This right should not be taken away from them.

In terms of bullying, wearing a uniform would only shift a bully's target from clothes (if that is the current target) to something else like hair style or height. No matter what someone is wearing, bullies will be bullies, so the school should look for other ways to prevent bullying that don't include making everyone wear the same thing.

In conclusion, uniforms limit creativity and personal style and can be a monetary issue for some families. They don't even prevent bullying during the school day. Uniforms should not be required at our school because this is our chance now for families to celebrate the clothing that best suits their children.
